It's that time again—our annual Runoff Autocross is happening in the West Lot of SDCCU Stadium on Saturday, June 2! Our eleventh runoff event honors the memory of Rug Cunningham, founder of Cunningham BMW, now BMW of El Cajon.

Eleven drivers will qualify for our 2018 Runoff by winning their car classes. The winner of the Runoff will get his or her name on the perpetual trophy and will receive a personal trophy to display with pride.

Our format includes one practice session for all drivers, followed by three timed runs to determine trophies for each class. The first-place winner of each car class earns a runoff position in the afternoon. As all other drivers continue to enjoy fun runs in the afternoon, each runoff contender will drive the same "mystery" car. The driver with the best time will be crowned our 2018 Runoff Champion. Will it be you?

Onsite registration costs \$10 extra, so register online & early!

Important:

- Only Snell 2010 and 2015 helmets are allowed
- All cars MUST be under a 91 dB noise level and we'll be checking! Over 91 dB = no autocross.
- You must be a BMW CCA member to participate.
 Join online at www.bmwcca.org in advance. Bring your membership card or print your membership confirmation if you have not yet received your membership card.
- We usually fill all the spots prior to the event, so register online early. \$10 extra to register onsite!
- If you choose to register onsite, bring cash or check and arrive by 7:30 am.
- The entry fee of \$65 includes breakfast items, lunch and beverages. Additional lunches for guests can be purchased for \$8 at Registration.
- We do not cancel for rain.

Newcomers:

We've all had a first time and we're all still learning, so relax, have fun and enjoy your time with us. You will have an instructor take you around the course for one lap in your car

showing you turn-in points, braking zones and so on. Your instructor will then ride with you for your next three laps helping you learn the course. In your next session, and during the timed runs, you can have an instructor with you or you can go solo if your instructor feels you're ready. Improve your driving skills, increase your confidence, and experience your car's capabilities in a fun, safe and stress-free environment. Through our classroom sessions, car-control exercises and autocross practice, you will learn skills and techniques that will be applicable to real-world driving situations. Our classroom instructor, the Principal Instructor of American Driving School, will discuss everything from proper seating and mirror positions to oversteer and understeer. After class, our experienced driving instructors will help you master the car control exercises. Then, in the afternoon, we'll do all the exercises in succession in one big course.

Who can register?

Anyone with a valid driver's license who is 16 or older. Drivers under the age of 18 years must bring a parent or guardian to sign the Minor Release Waiver. Two drivers may share one car, but both drivers must register separately.

Is a BMW CCA membership required?

Registration will be open to BMW CCA members on March 1 and will open to non-members on April 1.

What cars are allowed?

All marques are welcome. Cars must pass our tech inspection. SAV, SUV and trucks are not permitted at this particular event.

Cost

The cost of this event is \$80. Coffee and muffins will be available first thing in the morning, and water will be on hand all day, but lunch will not be provided.

What to expect

If the day runs as scheduled, each driver should get two 40-45 minute run sessions which should result in 20-25 laps in total. Additionally, each driver will have two 40-45 minute rest sessions and one 80-90 minute work session.

Sound Limit

The stadium's normal sound limit of 91dB will be in effect. Cars over the limit won't be able to run and entry fee will not be refunded.

Timing

Timing equipment will be running and the display will be available for drivers to see, but times will not be recorded.

Items to bring

Driver's license, snacks or lunch, sunscreen, hat, Snell 2010 or newer helmet.

Insurance

As with most parking lot or track events, your insurance may not be valid. Check with your individual carrier.

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ON MARCH 24 AND 25, THE SAN DIEGO

and Central California Chapters of the BMW Car Club put on a Driving School sponsored by BMW of Escondido. The weather was fantastic and the event was a resounding success! As I think back to when I started participating in driving events with the club, I recall a time where there were more events among the West Coast chapters. Nowadays, we find ourselves in a more competitive environment where there are more driving events from a variety of organizations, leading to lower attendance of our schools. In December, I was elected to take over the Driving Events Chair for the San Diego Chapter from Anne Littrell AND in January started a new daytime job. I had my work cut out for me! With the help of Tim Brecht, Anne Littrel, and Matthew Kogan, we spent a long evening in December hatching a plan to add some spice back into our driving program.

Historically, the BMW CCA driving program offers a unique experience with a strong focus on education and skill-building at a very reasonable price point. However, our schools are typically priced higher than other organizations that don't place the same emphasis on driver education. We offer one of the best places for you to get out and learn to drive your car at the limit. We start by attracting a large group of fantastic instructors from all over the West Coast. These instructors are the ambassadors of our organization. This dedicated group of volunteers gets you out on the tarmac driving the wheels off your car with safety and confidence.





You don't have to make a special request for an instructor as you would in other organizations; instead, we provide an in-car instructor for the duration of the event. They are paid with your smiles and an opportunity to drive their own cars on the track. One of the innovations of this event was to give our instructors more track time: eight sessions over the weekend instead of the typical two. The instructors are strongly encouraged to take students along for rides, an experience not to be missed! The additional driving time for our instructors gives them ample opportunities to earn more of your smiles and open your eyes to what is possible with your BMW.

The BMW Car Club driving schools always have a solid number of novice and intermediate drivers that are eager to learn and excited to get instruction at our events. Our advanced drivers, however, have the skills to run with any organization, even those without instructors. So, in addition to giving our instructors more track time, we tried a few other new tricks. First,

instructors because driving with the folks in yellow shirts is a darn hoot. We also created a Time Trial group to give the more competitive drivers a chance to find out how they measure up against their peers. We were even able to offer a Race School in conjunction with NASA for those looking to get a license to get into some wheel-to-wheel racing. And for a lucky few, we offered an Advanced Data Coaching class to use telemetry to really get a data-driven analysis of your driving technique. All the adjustments to the program added up to a fantastic event with something for everyone, from the instructors, to the advanced drivers to the students that had never been on a track before.

These driving schools can't be successful without a tremendous effort from a large group of people. We had nearly 100 participants, 45 instructors, a cadre of key volunteers, and even a Car Show on Saturday with Big Euro's Nor Cal vs So Cal Event. It took a lot of planning







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and coordination to make sure everything went smoothly. I would like to extend a huge thanks to Matthew Kogan, my main partner in crime for organizing this event. I would also like to call out our chief instructors, Dan Tackett and Eddy Funahashi for organizing and managing our instructors. Kelly Moon is always amazing up in the tower, as she keeps the event day running like a Swiss watch. I also got some great help from Delight Lucas from the LA Chapter and Terry Eidson from the Central Cal Chapter

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
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Considering a cross-county drive this summer to Oktoberfest 2018 in Pittsburgh? Here's a Roundel article from Dan Tackett who took a (then) new X3 to Oktoberfest 2005 in Greensboro, NC. May his words inspire your own driving adventure this summer! —Ed.

Day 1 Sunday: San Diego – Las Vegas 338 miles, 22.1 mpg, 78.2 mph average

Joining the typical exodus of vehicles heading from LA for Las Vegas, we swam with the fast-paced school, averaging good speed just keeping up with traffic. A very familiar drive.

Day 2 Monday: Las Vegas - Mt. Charleston

We had a day of business instead of travel, meeting with the Mario Andretti Racing School (whose Corporate Sales Manager drives an Estoril Blue M Roadster). We burned too much gas on a trip up Mt. Charleston, leaving us to coast down in Neutral...at up to 100 mph!

Day 3 Tuesday: Las Vegas – Moab UT 23 miles, 21.1 mpg, 66.1 mph average

Some of the most amazing terrain in the world: Zion National Park, Escalante Canyon, Capitol Reef National Park, Moab UT. On the

winding roads, climbing up natural ridges and descending into washes, the X3 proved that it's a true BMW. The steering was very communicative with positive turn-in as our load struggled not to shift with each turn. Deviating from the Interstate should have slowed down the average speed, but the roads were largely clear so we could keep our average up. The eager steptronic trans did lots of hunting between 4th and 5th as the little motor worked its heart out.

Day 4 Wednesday: Moab UT area

Another day for planning instead of travel, spent preparing for future off-road and Western movie tours. The local trail expert reviewed several challenging hills and rock climbs, but we declined to test them in the X3. One close look at the bad-boy Bimmer through the eyes of a grizzled rock climbing veteran didn't leave him laughing too hard. Since off-roading isn't the X3's forte, we sought out scenic photo opps instead. Doing an impression of a serious photographer, I got down on recently-oiled asphalt for a dramatic low angle shot of the X3. Only later did we discover that some oil and gravel stuck to my pants and got on the seats, making me the first person to "tar and leather" a BMW. The seat cleaned up, but the pants were a write-off.

Day 5 Thursday: Moab UT – Hays KS 694 miles, 22.6 mpg, 78.1 mph average

A day full of boring interstate highway at least got off to an interesting start as we digested the rest of Utah, all of Colorado, and most of Kansas. Climbing into the Colorado Rockies, the 2.5 liter engine was clearly torque-challenged, struggling to keep the speed up to our (admittedly high) expectations. There was a lot of downshifting to 4th, and sometimes 3rd, so we tried the manual Steptronic mode to control our throttle openings. Our mileage average dropped to 18 mpg for a while, later improving with the descent into Denver and the flat prairie beyond. Eastern Colorado and Kansas were long on cattle, corn and big tractor trailers, short on memories. By late night, we've lost an hour in Central Time and pull into the hamlet of Hays, Kansas.

Day 6 Friday: Hays KS – Evansville IN 689 miles, 22.4 mpg, 70.2 mph average

Another long trek took us across the rest of Kansas, Missouri, and Illinois, ending up just inside Indiana. Flat plains turned into rolling green hills, but cattle and semis were still plentiful. Lengthy Interstate repaving projects shoved our fellow motorists into one lane, with endless jams of heavy trucks slowing our average speed. But whenever we had two lanes, a refreshing pattern emerged that remained



throughout the trip: Drivers actually watched their mirrors and moved out of the left lane to let us by. NO left-lane-bandits! I don't know who circulated the nationwide memo, but it was an impressive and consistent improvement over past experience. Maybe it just works on remote Interstates, because we're not about to run out of clueless drivers elsewhere.

Day 7 Saturday: Evansville IN – Greensboro NC 605 miles, 22.4 mpg, 72.7 mph average

Five states in one day: Indiana, Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, and North Carolina to reach Oktoberfest Central in Greensboro. Kentucky is beautiful: clean, green, and full of pastures with statuesque Thoroughbred horses. After being surrounded for days by domestic cars that, at least in California, scream RENTAL!, the import car count went way up today. A puzzling trend, until I remembered that Honda, Nissan and Toyota have plants to throw 'em together right in this neighborhood. Support the Home Team, buy a Camry! We find the Appalachian Mountains truly beautiful, with deep gorges, wide rivers, and entertaining winding Interstates. In Virginia, the Valentine One is temporarily retired due to their draconian ban on monitoring certain public radio frequencies. Average speed suffers in the interest of avoiding roadside interviews with the uniformed welcoming committee. This effort was not wholly successful on the return trip...



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Oktoberfest was its wonderful self, with all of the usual suspects and activities. We arrived with a windshield banner that read "West 2 O'Fest X3Press" and 11 states' worth of bugs. Other obligations prevented us from using the X3 in the autocross or TSD Rally (we wouldn't want to further humiliate Satch). Properly emptied for daily commutes to VIR, the X3's harsh ride returned, but at least the stiff suspension had an upside. There was a well-composed BMW chassis lurking somewhere below us, proving its entertainment value on the Fun Rally route. Taking sweepers at speed while sitting at this altitude felt a bit strange, but the X3 definitely has tight genes.

After the non-stop excitement of Oktoberfest, there was no way around the morning-after and a l-o-n-g drive home:

Day 1 Saturday: Greensboro NC – Sallisaw OK 1,001 miles, 22.6 mpg, 74.4 mph average

Dreams of driving home in a raffled M5 are rudely interrupted by an early wake-up call. The Wild West beckons, and it ain't getting any closer lying in bed. Our plan is to see the Pacific Ocean again in 4 days, but our secret hope is to do it in 3. We'll shoot for 800 miles and Little Rock, AR at a minimum. We're also trying to outrun Hurricane Rita, ravaging Eastern Texas and New Orleans today. North Carolina and Tennessee are very wide states with beautiful scenery and smooth roads. While we could stick our arms out the windows and touch states to the north and south, on I-40 West it's nearly dinnertime before we cross the Mississippi and enter the third state of the day. Looming clouds turn into heavy rain as we hit the outer bands of Rita, now a tropical storm. Behind the wheel, Erwin marvels at the great traction and stability that X-drive gives us in the wet. We keep our pace up, barely miss a restaurant evacuation at our dinner stop (tornado warning) and just make it inside Oklahoma with 1,000 miles for the day. That's OK.

Day 2 Sunday: Sallisaw OK – Kingman AZ 1,180 miles, 20.8 mpg, 80.0 mph average

Our most ambitious day of all, 17 hours, including the gain of two extra hours courtesy of entering the Pacific Time Zone. Our threeday goal is looking good. Behind us, most of Oklahoma, the Texas Panhandle, all of New Mexico, and most of Arizona. The weather is good as the storm has passed, but we're bucking a headwind that keeps our mpg well below 20 until the final downhill leg. The X3 has more frontal area and a high roof, overworking the little 2.5 as it searches for something resembling power in 4th gear. While BMW can't eliminate those inherent SUV traits, they have made the X3 live up to its autobahn breeding. In northeastern Arizona, a state official was kind enough to confirm our rate of progress at 105 mph. We'd just passed a tall-geared semi doing 95, reasoning that he knew the local conditions and that we had no worries. Except for instanton radar. Not a typical problem for SUVs from Honda or Ford, I'm guessing. The things we do to enlighten ROUNDEL readers.

Day 3 Monday: Kingman AZ – San Diego CA 480 miles, 23.2 mpg, 64 mph

Kingman, Las Vegas, then home again in just three days. Driving over the Hoover Dam, we saw a huge engineering project underway, building a wide highway bridge to span the deep canyon and eliminate the security risk of major truck traffic over this strategic site. In Las Vegas, we met a German journalist who just covered Timo Glock in the ChampCar race for an audience unfamiliar with race tracks that never turn right. Slow highways and a long downhill run from Vegas to the Coast kept our average speed down and mileage up.

After the world's longest test drive, we agreed that the X3 behaves like a BMW should, providing more activity than utility, if you really must sit up high in the nosebleed section.

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
