What car can I bring?

- We usually fill all the spots prior to the event, so register online early.

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Don DuncanOur Chapter Treasure(r)

AT THE AUGUST BOARD OF DIRECTORS

meeting, our Treasurer Don Duncan announced that he and his wife Mardelle would be moving to Camarillo in Ventura County to be closer to his grandchildren. Don submitted his official resignation letter on September 3. After being a hardworking Chapter member for over 25 years and our diligent Treasurer for 9 terms, we were all dismayed by the thought of not seeing his smiling face at events and meetings.

Don joined our Chapter at the urging of former President John Driscoll, who knew Don for years through their membership in a professional accountant association. He was looking for a safe car for his 16 year-old daughter, and as a fellow car enthusiast, he asked John for suggestions. Don bought her a 320i, the first BMW in his family, and his life has been never the same since. Don is a native San Diegan, raised in Lemon Grove, and always living in our county except during his stint in the US Air Force in Sacramento. Though he lost a twin brother at a young age, Don's hallmark was his big smile and positive attitude any time you saw him. His passions are his family, golf, fishing, and fun cars.



Don was always a car nut, owning a Porsche 912 and Datsun 240Z before he was introduced to BMWs. After buying a white 320i for his daughter, he was so impressed with it that he bought a blue one for himself and enjoyed it at Club events for years. Don and I drove to Colorado together for Oktoberfest '95, giving him a lot of time to experience the Euro E30 that I owned at the time. He realized that he "needed" more power for his 320i, and hoped to install an S14 M3 engine. Instead, I urged him to consider replacing it with a whole E30 M3. He ultimately bought one of the



nicest used E30 M3's in the country, a like-new Salmon Silver example from an oil executive in Texas. That car made the rounds to our clean car shows and Driving Schools for years, always looking perfect. When he got the itch for even more power, Don decided to invest in a classic '65 Corvette Stingray. With just one spot in the garage for a fun car, the M3 had to go. His hope to make the Corvette handle like a BMW didn't work out; it ending up being a car that cost as much as a BMW but never drove like one.

For Oktoberfest 2007 in Ft. Worth Texas, Don joined me for the whole adventure. I had recently purchased a one-of-a-kind E46 330i ZHP, customized with all-metal bodywork to mimic a (non-existent) M3 sedan. After a lot of time behind the wheel, Don fell in love with it and persuaded me to let him buy it when it really wasn't for sale. He's owned it ever since, being a fine caretaker of a unique car and making some tasteful changes (like wrapping the roof to look like carbon fiber in a current M car). That car has been to many a car show and driving school since, with its smiling owner always nearby. Don has almost become a fixture at the National Oktoberfests, driving to many, and building vacations with Mardelle around some far-away events.

In addition to his National profile, Don has been very active in Chapter social events and driving events and a regular at Board meetings. He was our Chapter President in 1997-98. His career as a hard-working executive accountant at SDGE prepared him well for his next important role in the Chapter, serving as our much-appreciated Treasurer since 2009. Our Chapter had been very generous over the years in making charitable donations and hosting free events for members, but that left us with dwindling cash reserves. When Don took over, he wanted to shift the emphasis to financial planning and forecasting, not just reporting the numbers. He set a goal to build up our cash in an equipment fund and to help our Board to make more informed decisions. Under his guidance (not always popular, but always wise), Don returned







our Chapter to very solid financial footing, and enabled us to purchase a used pickup for towing our driving events trailer without needing to touch the equipment fund. He presided over the complexity of distinguishing non-member income when our National Club was under IRS audit and new requirements had to be implemented. And he never took our cash and disappeared to Mexico!

Before and during Don's Board tenure, he was always volunteering to help at events. As a fan of driving schools, in addition to participating, he would help out with administration, flagging, transportation, and any other tasks needed. Don experienced track schools from Buttonwillow to Laguna Seca to the legendary Nurburgring. At autocross events, for years he helped at the registration table, then spent the day managing course workers and transporting them efficiently to keep the event on time. Don would often get up early for events to help out even when he wasn't participating himself. He took several trips in the Club truck and trailer to support events while his BMW stayed home in the garage.

This is the mark of genuine volunteer: putting in lots of hours on behalf of the Chapter without any personal benefit. We know that we're an all-volunteer organization, but most of us at least get to have some fun along with the work. This is another part of what makes Don a real Chapter Treasure. Our Chapter's highest honor is being voted by members to receive our Bill Brecht Memorial Volunteer of the Year award, which Don earned and richly deserved. He will remain a San Diego Chapter member with hopes to visit occasionally. We will all miss Don's smile, good nature, volunteerism and fiscal guidance. But most of all we will miss his friendship. Don has spent many weekends driving up to Ventura County to visit his family. We want to remind him that I-5 is a two-way road that comes back to his San Diego BMW family too!

point. I'm officially old and out of touch with today's youth.

"Do you [your club] do low limbo," inquires two teenagers featuring plugs and lip piercings. I was flummoxed, failing to connect limbo to cars quickly enough. My confused retort, "low... limbo?... Noooo."

The pair laughed in unison and walked away. If I were swifter with my jocularity I would've mentioned how I fancy an intact oil pan. If you're still wondering what low limbo is, it's the equivalent of a limbo contest for cars. The lowest car that can still drive under the limbo bar wins. Apparently, today's youth has low expectations for what their high-performance cars can do.

We're at Big SoCal Euro; a yearly gathering of nearly 3,000 European auto enthusiasts whose average age is 10-15 years my junior. To put this in perspective, my driver's license is of driver's license age. These enthusiasts represent the next twenty to thirty years of automotive enthusiasm. It stands to reason the club needs to listen, understand, and engage these enthusiasts regardless of how we define

automotive enjoyment.

If you've never attended Big SoCal Euro, the entire west lot of Qualcomm turns into a Bimmerfest-like all-European marques car show and tailgate.

And our San Diego Chapter has been an exhibitor for years, bringing awareness of the BMW Car Club of America and encouraging new membership. We also have fun showcasing some of our members' rides.

Selling the benefits of joining the club is easy. Club cruises, parts and labor discounts, new and CPO BMW rebates, tech sessions and social events, the knowledge bank and support from fellow members and sponsors, and autocrosses or HPDE's are great conversation starters. Eyes routinely grow wide when they learn we run autocross layouts that consume the size of the entire SoCal Euro event.

This year our booth showcased six exemplary performance-oriented cars spanning classic to modern BMWs. It was a breath of fresh air from the endless number of highly modified modern show cars from other exhibitors.



BMW CCA National President Steve Johnson loaned his "WAHR M3" E30 M3, complete with a 2.5L stroker S14, Koni struts, larger sway bars, M-Tech II steering wheel and more. The boxed fenders, classic styling, BMW CCA grille badge and classic M3 logos are enough to grab attention from any enthusiast. Wahr M3, indeed.

For a taste of modern, member Ryan Moore brought his 2015 F80 M3 Individual in Laguna Seca Blue on Sakhir Orange interior. Featuring Bilstein PSS10 coil-overs with Ground Control camber plates, 6-speed manual transmission, Active Autowerke Signature exhaust, Status Gruppe carbon fiber diffuser, and Vorsteiner VFF-103 wheels, this car has performance and style modifications that draw people in.

Shawn Nekouei provided a classic BMW with his 1969 BMW 2002 "M2 Evo." Round taillights, Chamonix finish, steel wheels with polished hub caps, and a wood "Lux" trim present a nicely restored roundie. Open the hood and you're in for a surprise. This two thousand pound Ultimate Driving Machine houses a 2.5L S14 Evo motor with Evo sport cams. While the car hasn't been dynoed, Evo motors are known for producing upwards of 240hp. Plenty enough for a Neue Klasse to leave people bewildered when it pulls on cars 30-40 years newer. If this car looks familiar, it's because you might have seen it featured on Stance/Works, Petrolicious, or his Instagram account @m2evo.

Neil Daly braved the wet roads in Lucy, his Baltic Blau 1984 BMW E30 318i. Featuring an S52 conversion with Dinan supercharger, this car is street legal and passes CA smog. The car is cool, literally: Methanol injection for cool air temps, an oil cooler and power steering cooler, not to mention a working AC to keep the driver equally cool. A limited slip differential, Ground Control coil-overs, E46 steering rack with rack spacers for angle, and standalone hydraulic



hand brake means this car handles, drifts, and power slides with ease. Those chrome polished bottle cap wheels are becoming rarer and rarer by the day, too. If you've attended autocross, you've likely seen Lucy and Neil in action. This car attracted a great deal of attention among the turbo and supercharger modders in attendance.

Malcolm Hill supplied a modern unicorn and future classic with his 2009 BMW e91 328i Sportwagon M-Sport. This car is tricked-out featuring a 6-speed manual, Life Cycle Impulse, rear wheel drive, Bilstein PSS10 coilovers, front and rear M-control arms, M3 rear sub-frame bushings, H&R rear sway bar, and BMW Performance Exhaust—clearly built for autocross and track days. It's a shame BMW has abandoned RWD, straight-six wagons because this car proves that wagons are cool. #ProperRoofLength #SaveTheWagons.

Last but certainly not least was a BMW E9 CSL, courtesy of Carl Nelson. The car's wild styling,

classic shark nose front, distinct rear wing, Fjord Blau paint with M-stripes, immaculate interior with deep CSL bucket seats, and a 3.8L M30 drew quite a crowd. Many attendees were slack-jawed, stunned to see a real CSL.

I often am asked, 'How can I get involved?' Events like this are a perfect way to volunteer a little time to support the club and meet fellow members and enthusiasts. I've learned that the club is what you make of it, so it's up to you to get the most out of being a member. A special thanks to all our volunteers who helped make this year's event a successful one, from setup and teardown, to staffing the booth.

If there's one thing I've learned about the Big SoCal Euro crowd, it's that variety is the spice of life. Our club is open to everyone and there is something for everyone. If you haven't been to Big SoCal Euro, check it out in 2018. Because next year may be the last year at this location.

Resurrecting an E30: Part 2



CARFAX FORENSICS

Last issue, I covered my trials and tribulations getting my project 325e set up with a new catalytic converter and exhaust in preparation for smog. I was successful in the endeavor, and consider myself very lucky avoiding retests due to a vacuum issue or other related problem.

Whenever I buy a used car, I always purchased either a CARFAX vehicle history report or an Autocheck report to learn about ownership history, where the car previously lived and, if possible, where it was serviced. Unfortunately, paintwork and other issues are not recorded in these reports, so that must be done in person. Some individuals trust their eyes to spot orange peel, while others prefer a paint gauge to detect inconsistent application levels.

For this installment, I discuss the fascinating information I learned about the history of my 325e from publicly available records.

The CARFAX report for my 325e contained 34 service history records for a sum of 47 total records. In conjunction with the receipts I received with the car, this translated to almost 60 lines of data in my maintenance/purchase tracking spreadsheet. Unfortunately, the data only went back to 1991, a full six years after the car had been on the road. But the information still proved valuable and interesting.

Parsing through the available records revealed that the car had spent considerable time with an owner who lived in or around Trona, California, a small, unincorporated community with a population of less than 2,000. Situated roughly halfway between the southern portions of the Sequoia National Forest and Death Valley National Park, the town was named after an ingredient used to make soda ash.


Reading further, the same individual preferred to have the vehicle serviced at BMW of Palm Springs, which appeared dozens of times throughout the report. Oil services had been carried out on time by the dealership, as well as headlights, brakes, and cooling components. Even small things, like the washer fluid reservoir, drive belts and the fan clutch had been addressed.

I was pleasantly surprised to learn that the car had at least one caring owner in the past. However, given the age of the replaced components, my own peace of mind was the biggest takeaway. That was until I noticed a line item from May 2001 stating the cylinder head gasket had been replaced, which seemed to make all of the research a bit more worthwhile.

Continuing to sort through the information in the report, I learned that another individual residing in the San Diego area had owned the car for a while. This person also practiced regular maintenance according to the records, but the servicing was performed at a non-BMW dealer. After this, the report shows that the owner I purchased the car from took it on a few trips between San Diego and the Bay Area, where he had the timing belt and a few other maintenance items addressed by BMW of Concord, all of which corresponded with the paper records I had.

Learning about the car's history was certainly interesting, and it definitely helped answer questions. For example, most of us know that E30 and E28 dashes like to crack, and my car is no exception. However, I have a feeling it was brought on by the heat in the Trona and Palm Springs areas. Furthermore, the replaced head gasket and timing belt gave me validation that I had made a solid purchase considering the price I paid.

I still had some questions though. CARFAX showed a mileage discrepancy between some of the records, and given the car's low (broken) odometer reading, I suspected the instrument cluster had been swapped at some point. Totaling up the mileage between the various service records showed the E30 was likely approaching 300,000 miles, rather than around




130,000 displayed in the current instrument cluster.

Another interesting find was the vehicle emissions test history, which I viewed at BAR.CA.gov. This report revealed that the car had never failed smog before, and was not classified as a gross polluter. This explained why I passed smog on the very first attempt with just a new catalytic converter and exhaust.

CONCLUSION

I hope you learned a few things for when you might have to dive into the history of a used vehicle. Next time, I'll discuss the build sheet for my car along with some of the resources I use to purchase and maintain a used BMW.

Dan Covill Remembering a Chapter Icon

OUR FORMER CHAPTER PRESIDENT AND

Fahren Affairs Editor, Dan Covill, passed away peacefully at age 87 on September 23rd. Dan was a true Chapter icon for a couple of decades. He and I happened to join BMW CCA at the same time in 1983, and we met at the first Board meeting that we both attended. He had recently bought an E28 5 Series and wanted to meet other BMW owners. I had an E12 5 Series at the time, so our bond began over our similar cars. Dan became a Board meeting regular, never shy about contributing to discussions with wellreasoned ideas. Owning a successful computer consulting business, he was a source of wise advice leavened with his good humor. Dan had a rapier wit and was an engaging raconteur. His storytelling always gathered a crowd, and he had an endearing habit of repeating the punch line of a joke under his breath while chuckling at it. He once told me that "I can speak semiintelligently on any topic for 10 minutes, even if you didn't tell me what the topic was until I was standing there." What he meant was that he could sound knowledgeable and BS any crowd on a moment's notice!

Dan's Club passion was our driving events. Though San Diego wouldn't host its first HPDE for another 6 years after he joined (when he volunteered to organize it), he participated in a lot of LA Chapter events at Willow Springs, Riverside, and Laguna Seca, and learned how they worked. In 1984, Dan and I took the plunge and attended our first Nürburgring BMW Driving School, partnering in a shared car (a BMW AGprovided E30) and touring around Germany afterwards. He had been stationed in post-war Germany and learned the language, so he was a

perfect travel partner for my first trip to Germany. Dan had a fascination with the woodcarver Tilman Riemenschneider, and we visited several cathedrals featuring his work. He was also very quick on every track, shaming many a young driver who felt like they just got passed by Santa Claus!

Dan's Chapter involvement grew over time. He edited Fahren Affairs in 1986-88, pasting up articles by hand and writing many of them himself. He was a very good and prolific writer, reviewing the many events he organized or attended for Chapter members to read about. For years he regularly wrote a column called "Aus dem Vaterland" (From the Fatherland) in which he translated articles about the latest BMWs from German magazines. These were pre-internet days, and BMW news was hard to get, so he was an excellent source. Dan is the only American I know who had a subscription to Auto Motor und Sport, the top German auto magazine. He was also published in Roundel a few times.


In 1987, while I was Chapter President, I accepted a new job in LA and had to leave at the end of the year. Dan cleverly announced my departure by writing in Fahren Affairs, "There's now a no-punning on the Board." And then he did an amazing thing: Dan stepped up to serve as Chapter President while still producing Fahren Affairs, doing the two biggest Chapter jobs simultaneously for a year! He found a new FA Editor in 1989 and continued as President for a second term. Dan's next role was to structure and manage our first racetrack Driving School at the Las Vegas International Speedway (LVIS, how appropriate for Vegas). As a long-distance event,

his masterful organizing skills enabled him to put on a smooth operation equal to those hosted by experienced Chapters. Continuing to manage our Schools for years, Dan helped to establish the good reputation that our Chapter enjoys for hosting driving events. He stayed active on our Board, managing our database and being very involved in later driving events as a track and classroom instructor.

Dan was a real character, always ready with a captivating story or opinion to share with anyone nearby. Anyone who met him can't help but remember him fondly. In recent years, he wound down his Club involvement to enjoy his retirement and spend more time with his four grandkids. His last Chapter event was visiting our Car Show in May 2015 and seeing lots of friends, shortly after buying a new 328d.

Rest In Peace, my friend. I will miss your hearty laugh and remember so many great adventures. You enriched our BMW Community and leave a proud legacy behind.

VICE PRESIDENT

- Attend board meetings and vote on issues as required.

- Act as Membership Chair by sending welcome letters to all new members.
- Answer numerous email inquiries concerning membership.

TREASURER

- Attend board meetings and vote on issues as required.
- Reconcile accounts payable and receivable on a monthly basis.
- · Present chapter financial status at board meetings.
- Perform financial analysis for cash flow, income, and expenses.
- · Verify expenses and write reimbursement checks.
- Oversee the preparation of the annual tax return for the IRS
- Prepare the Chapter Financial Report to national by March 31st of each calendar year.

SECRETARY

- · Keep accurate minutes of each Board Meeting.
- Present the previous month's minutes to the Board for approval.
- Submit monthly minutes for publication in the newsletter and website.

DIRECTOR/AUTOCROSS

- Ensure the event is on schedule and supervise throughout the event.
- Coordinate procurement of trophies before the event and present them at the end of the event.
- Provide event information to newsletter editor and webmaster for publication.
- Manage email contact list and communicate with members about upcoming events to maximize attendance.
- Manage online registration, including timely updates to the registration website and generating reports of paid attendees.
- Report to the Board of Directors on the financial results and needs of the autocross program.

DIRECTOR/DRIVING SCHOOL

- Attend board meetings and vote on issues as required.
- Plan all aspects of the driving school.
- Coordinate the volunteer staff for the annual driving school
- Arrange liability insurance for the school by submitting the insurance certificate request.
- Coordinate with the motel to ensure rooms are reserved for instructors and students.
- Coordinate with the Chief Instructor to ensure there are enough instructors for the school.
- Coordinate with the Chief Steward for track supervision.
- Coordinate with the track officials for dates, track rental fees, corner workers, emergency medical vehicle, and all necessary equipment.
- Oversee logistics for the chapter's equipment transport.
- Submit the Driving Events Reporting Form within 30 days of the driving school.

DIRECTOR/EQUIPMENT MEISTER

- Maintain supply of wrist bands and insurance waiver forms.
- Organize trailer equipment and loading plan.
- Transport club truck and trailer to and from each autocross event.
- Assist with set-up and teardown of equipment, helmet rentals/returns, packing/unpacking trailer at autocross events.
- Coordinate use of truck and trailer with Driving School Director for annual driving school.
- Transfer items not currently in use from trailer to club storage unit to open up space in trailer.

DIRECTOR/NEWSLETTER EDITOR

- Attend board meetings and vote on issues as required.
- · Write/edit material for newsletter.
- · Provide photos for the newsletter.
- Lay out submitted articles, ads, photos, etc. for each issue as required.
- Coordinate with the printer to ensure the newsletter is published eleven times per year.
- Provide updated mailing lists to the printer.
- Provide newsletter in PDF format to chapter Webmeister and National BMW CCA website.

DIRECTOR/SOCIAL EVENTS

- Attend board meetings and vote on issues as required.
- · Research local events.
- Present information on events to the board for consideration.
- Procure tickets.
